HAPPY BIRTHDAY EVERYONE

When I first saw notices that Amateur Radio was 100 years old this year it didn't quite make sense. Wireless has been around since the 1890's and there were plenty of early "Hams" heating up the either. So I decided to do some research. In 1895 Nikola Tesla was able to receive a signal over a distance of 80 km (49.7 miles). In 1896 Guglielmo Marconi, who was only 22 at the time, transmitted Morse Code over a distance of 6 km (3.7 miles) on the Salisbury Plain in England. In 1899 Marconi had increased the distance so as to be able to send signals across the English Channel. In 1901 he received a signal transmitted from Poldhu, Cornwall, Great Britain at Signal Hill in St. John's, Newfoundland, Canada. The first voice transmission was in 1906 by a Canadian, Reginald Fessenden. Even though these people get all the credit there were many others experimenting with this new mode of communication. So what makes 1912 so great that it is credited with the start of Amateur Radio? Well we almost didn't get started. In 1910 Senator Chauncey Depew of New York had a bill in the Senate that would prohibit experimentation by Amateur Radio Operators. He was afraid of interference to the U.S. Navy.

His bill failed and a year later the Radio Act of 1912 was passed. This was the law that required licensing of all radio stations by the Federal Government and that all seagoing vessels monitor distress frequencies at all times. The main reason for this law was the sinking of the Titanic. It was learned that there was a ship closer to the Titanic than the Carpathia but the radio operator was not on duty so it did not hear the distress call from the Titanic. Another reason for the law was that some of the early "Hams" took delight in sending fake Naval messages and distress calls. Before 1912 no one was licensed. Everyone made up his own call and there were no technical requirements for a station. So this is why we say that Amateur Radio is 100 years old in 2012. It's from when the licensing started. In the same time frame the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, France and Argentina started licensing their Amateurs and adopting rules for operation. In 1927 the Radio Act of 1927 replaced the Radio Act of 1912 and created the Federal Radio Commission. There were approximately 30,000 Hams at that time. Prior to 1929 Hams were only allowed on fre-



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quencies of 200 meters (1.5 MHz) and down. They were also restricted as to location and operating hours. But in 1929 Hams were given the "experimental" bands of 160, 80, 40, 20 and 10 meters that are all harmonically related (15 was not added until 1952 for CW and 1953 for phone). The next big change was in 1934 when the Communications Act of 1934 did away with the Federal Radio Commission and replaced it with the Federal Communications Commission. Part 97 contains the rules and regulations for Amateur operation. 2012 may be the 100th Anniversary of Amateur Radio but, better get ready for another party. The ARRL turns 100 in two years.
