FIELD DAY IS HERE

Since the second Saturday in June 1933 (except for the war years) hams have been hitting the great outdoors for Field Day. The first Field Day started at 4PM local time and ran for 27 hours. The winner of the first annual Field Day was a non-club group signing W4PAW. They made 67 QSO's and had a multiplier of 28 sections/countries for a total of 1876 points. Even though the ARRL Field Day rules packet says "Always the fourth full weekend in June" this hasn't always been true. Starting with the second Field Day in 1934 the date would vary from the first to the third weekend for many years. In 1936 the June Field Day was so popular that they added a second one in August. In 1937 they added the Field Day Message from ARRL Headquarters. In 1940 the ARRL made major changes to the rules that still remain today. They also upped the bonus points for the Field Day Message. In fact from 1933 to 1980 the message points changed 12 times. In 1941 Field Day started simultaneously across the country by accident. In this time frame every portable station needed FCC approval for Field Day operation. The FCC referred to a single operating period for all stations. The theory is that the FCC did not realize that the ARRL meant local time for the start. It wasn't until 1957 that the simultaneous start returned although it was still at 4PM. The 1900Z start time wouldn't come into effect until 1968 and then changed again to 1800Z in 1970. In 1950 the modern Field Day Classes for stations were established and in 1966 most of the modern Bonus Points were added. In 1980 the last major change was made. The RST report was replaced with the category and class exchange.

As of right now we plan on having two stations (Class 2A) operational this Field Day. A Phone/RTTY station and a CW station. We will be back at Bee Meadow Park the same site where we have been for the last two years. Even it you can't find time to operate we always need extra hands for setup and take down. The setup time will be decided at Monday's meeting and will be in a special Field Day email on Friday night. Take down will be at the end of Field Day at 1800Z (2PM) on Sunday June 26. At Monday's meeting we will set the times and review the logging software and the rigs that we will be using. Come on out and have some fun. This is the only time that some of you get on the low bands and this year there are sun spots. There will be control operators here so that people with any (or no) class of license can operate. This year because of other commitments the Field Day results will not be available until after the 4th of July.

WE'RE EVERYWHERE

Narrative by Marty Knutson the first pilot selected to fly in the U-2 program about one of his missions:

"But the most exciting mission I ever flew was out of a small landing field at Peshawar in Pakistan, where we had a support unit set up in late 1958. The flight was so long range that there was no way for me to get back to the base. My main target was in Kazakhstan, a radar and missile test center, then on to a nuclear test site near Semipalatinsk and finally an overflight of a main ICBM launch test facility. By then I would have stretched the airplane's range to the limit and would be nearly out of gas. The plan called for me to glide over the Urals to save fuel and land at a tiny World War II airstrip near Zahedan, in Iran, right in the triangle where Afghanistan, India, and Pakistan converge. The agency would send in a C-130 with agents armed with grenades and tommy guns to secure the base from mountain bandits who controlled that territory. If I made it across the border and saw a cloud of black smoke, it meant that the field was being attacked by the bandits. If that happened, I was supposed to eject and bail out. I crossed the Russian border with only a hundred gallons of fuel remaining. Really getting hairy. I didn't see any smoke, so I came in and landed with less than twenty gallons left in the tank. One of the agents had a six pack of beer icing. They had an antenna set up and were supposed to send a coded message that I was safe. One of the guys came to me and said, "Our equipment is down. I know you're a ham operator, do you, by any chance, know Morse code?". I'm sitting there under a blazing sun, still in my pressure suit, sipping a beer in one hand, and with the other tapping out the dots and dashes."
