ANOTHER CONTEST SEASION HAS STARTED

It's fall and that means one thing. It's Contest Season again. This weekend is the JARTS RTTY Contest and the CQ World Wide CW Contest is the weekend after Thanksgiving. In between are a bunch of Sweepstakes, Phone, CW, Digital and VHF contests and that is just the start. In December there is the ARRL 10 Meter Contest. Take your choice, CW, Phone or both in the same contest. The weekend before (December 7th) is the 10 Meter RTTY Contest sponsored by RTTY Contesting.com.

Whether you're out to show the world what a great operator you are or you're just looking for a few new pieces of wallpaper a contest is the perfect venue. If you've never tried contesting here's a few tips to help you get started.

- Pick something you would be comfortable with.
 Try a state QSO party or another small contest
 where you will not be fighting the rest of the
 world for a contact.
- 2. Read the rules first and figure out the exchange. Contests usually have different exchanges although there are some common ones. Some exchange CQ Magazine zones. We are in zone 05. If it is the ITU zone we are 8. Some contests want the signal report and your age (YL's and XYL's can send 00). It could be your state or ARRL section. If you can't find the exchange then listen to what the other stations in the area are sending. In some contests we may send the state but DX stations send a power level report (KW, 500, 250 etc.).
- 3. Listen first. Get the feel of the contest and the exchanges.
- 4. Don't try for the big guns first. They're trying to run as many stations as fast as they can. Wait until closer to the end of the contest. Then when there are fewer stations to pick from they

- will take time to work a beginner. They are looking for any QSO point they can find at that point in the contest.
- 5. If you and another station are tuning through the band in the same direction and end up trying to work the same stations, reverse your direction. Work to the end of the band and then start in the other direction again. That way you may have worked a few more stations and he is now far enough away so as to not cause you any problems.
- If you're working USB phone start at the high end of the band and tune down. That way you don't have to tune through the Donald Duck sound of a station.
- 7. If you hear a DX station calling with no one coming back to him, or he is only working stations in a different area then propagation to that part of the world is probably poor. You can try one or two calls but don't waste your time on a station that probably will not come back to you.
- Use a propagation program before the contest to see what bands will be open to which parts of the world and at what time so that you can plan your band changes.
- Keep tuning. Many times I've worked a rare station that just came on the band before he was posted on a DX Cluster and whole world tried to work him.
- Remember to have fun. You don't have to work the whole 24 or 48 hours of a contest. Come and go as you please or when it fits in with other things you have to do. The main thing is to enjoy yourself.

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A PROPAGATION PRIMER

I ran across an article by Barry Manz in Military Microwave Digest. Barry is a well known Editor and Publisher of publications for the Microwave and Communications industry. He also happens to be WB2TSY. The article is about High Frequency SIGINT. Signals Intelligence (often abbreviated as SIGNET) is intelligence gathering by interception of signals. The article


