WE'RE OFFICIALLY IN THE DOLDRUMS

It's been two weeks since there was a visible sunspot and then it only lasted two days. It was an old one from Cycle 24. So far this year 72% of the days have been sunspot free. This is equal to the Cycle 23 minimum but, predictions are for this minimum to last another year to late 2020 with 300 more spotless days. Experts are also saying that Cycle 25 will be a low activity one equal to Cycle 24 and will be slow to start and ramp up with a peak occurring between 2023 and 2026, and a sunspot range of 95 to 130 which is about 100 below average. Lisa Upton, PhD., solar physicist with Space Systems Research Corp says "We expect solar Cycle 25 will be very similar to Cycle 24, another weak cycle, preceded by a long, deep minimum. The expectation that cycle 25 will be comparable in size to cycle 24 means that the steady decline in solar cycle amplitude seen from cycles 21-24, has come to an end and that there is no indication that we are currently approaching a Maunder-type minimum in solar activity."

The new refreshment committee W2YTI and W2ENU made their debut with cider and doughnuts.



He Will Discuss League Action On Proposed New FCC Regulations For Radio Operations

Thomas McCann, president of the Morris Radio Club, announced today that Walter Bradley Martin, Director of the Atlantic Division of the American Radio Relay League, will be the guest speaker at a special meeting of the Club to be held Wednesday, October 26th, 8 P. M., at the Vail School, Speedwell Avenue, Morris Township. He will outline the actions taken by the League relative to the proposed new Federal Communications Commission's regulations for amateur radio operations.

Mr. Martin has been active in amateur circles for many years and has served as a director of the American Radio Relay League from 1936 to 1945 and from 1948 to date. He has been re-elected to another two-year term, starting January 1, 1950. He holds the rank of Commander in the United States Naval Reserve, serving as Fourth Naval Disserve, serving as Fourth Naval District Reserve electronics warfare program officer. Mr. Martin's amateur affiliations include the Philadelphia Amateur Radio Association, York Radio Club, ARRL Emergency Corps and the A-1 Operator's Club.

The meeting was then adjourned but continued informally until 10:30


